District VII Board of Directors Report

Greetings from your new District 7 Board of Directors member! SAF is in the process of transitioning from the old Council structure to the new Board of Directors (BoD) structure. As part of this process, the Board is working to refine its job which is to lead the organization toward the desired performance and to ensure that that performance occurs. This job description can be loosely clumped into two major areas: providing leadership, policy, and strategic direction to meet SAF's mission and providing fiduciary oversight and accountability. At the March 2015 BoD

meeting, we spent time working on improved governance and internal operations resulting in the following actions:

Board Policy Manual

The Board of Directors adopted the governance concepts, approach, and framework expressed in the book, *Good Governance for Nonprofits*, as its governance roadmap. Given the recently redeveloped Articles of Incorporation and revised bylaws, the board members used the book at the December 2014 board meeting to develop an initial understanding of what good board governance should be. The board's acceptance of this roadmap does not alter how the board operates. The Roadmap codifies existing policies on effective board governance in a new Board Policy Manual and provides a framework for review and evaluation of board policy.

Financial Reserve Policy

The Board voted to pass a financial reserve policy, which states that SAF is to maintain cash reserves to meet the goals of:

- Having sufficient cash for day-to-day operations (Operating Cash Reserve),
- Having sufficient and readily available cash for contingencies (Contingency Reserve), and
- Maintaining long-term investments in order to meet significant programmatic needs through growth and earnings (Long-Term Reserves).

The policy also places limits on the use of the reserve funds by requiring monies to be repaid if used for programmatic or contingency needs.

One of my BoD assignments is that I serve as a member of the Finance Committee which develops and recommends to the board those financial principles, plans, and courses of action that provide for mission accomplishment and organizational financial well-being. Two other activities from the March BoD meeting related to external relations where SAF is inviting SAF's partners to tell us how they see SAF and leadership development. Summaries of these activities are presented. The external relations process was started at the December 2014 meeting and was continued at the March meeting.

External Relations: How SAF's Partners See the Organization

Speakers David Tenny, CEO, National Alliance of Forest Owners; Donna Harman, CEO, American Forest and Paper Association; and Joe Tague, Division Chief, Forestry, Range,

Riparian and Plant Conservation, USDI Bureau of Land Management, made clear (or perhaps reinforced), the notion that SAF's partners in the natural resources conservation community perceive the Society as the voice for credible, science-based information on forest management. They do not necessarily look to SAF to take a leadership role in advocating for forest management.


As your Board member, I challenge you and all of the SAF leaders at the state and local levels in District VII to be the voice of credible, science-based information on forest management on relevant issues in your region/state/locality both inside and outside the forestry community.

Leadership Development Efforts

In what was the first of a series of sessions with the board, members and other forestry stakeholders, effective leadership consultant Mark Cannon led members through an exercise in which they ranked the attributes of effective leadership by order of importance to foresters and forestry professionals. According to the board, the top five ranked attributes were: *Visionary, Ethical, Competence, Communicative, and Results-Oriented.*

Cannon will be working with SAF's staff to further identify key leadership attributes as the underpinnings for creating a leadership development curriculum for SAF. The staff is working with the board to design a three-tiered leadership development program that includes "101-level" online leadership development courses designed to serve as a foundation for further, more intensive opportunities at both the regional and national levels.

I want to thank you for your support of me as your member of the Board and ask that you contact me with any questions or issues that you might have. Allegheny Society Winter Meeting Wilkes-Barre – East Mountain Holiday Inn February 18-20, 2015

The 2015 Winter Meeting, hosted by the Pinchot Chapter, opened on Wednesday, February 18th with the Executive Committee Meeting, followed by an Icebreaker Reception. The session on Thursday opened with a welcome from Todd Hagenbuch, Pinchot Chapter Chair. Dr. Jim Finley, Ibberson Chair of Forest Resource Management and the Director for the Center for Private Forests at Penn State presented the keynote address which focused on private land forestry issues in Pennsylvania.

Morning speakers featured Vincent Cotrone, Urban Forester and Penn State Extension-Luzerne County, who delivered a presentation on ecological services that trees and forests provide to communities. Richard Fritsky, wildlife biologist with the Pennsylvania Game Commission, spoke about managing for bird and mammal forest specialists.

The Thursday afternoon session featured a panel discussion on private land forest management issues, including forest stewardship. Matt Keefer, Assistant State Forester in Pennsylvania moderated the panel which included Dan Rider, Maryland DNR Forest Service; Sam Topper, Delaware Department of Agriculture Forest Service; Jon Klischies, New Jersey Forest Service; Bob Radspinner, West Virginia Division of Forestry; and Rachel Reyna, Section Chief, Pennsylvania Bureau of Forestry.

The annual college Quiz Bowl completed the afternoon session. Teams from Penn State-University Park, Penn State- Mont Alto, Allegany College of Maryland and West Virginia University competed to correctly answer the most forestry questions. This year the team from Penn State-University Park took home the trophy. After dinner, James Brozena, past Executive Director, Luzerne County Flood Protection Authority, presented a fascinating story of "The Battle for the Wyoming Valley". He recounted the challenges of working to protect the region during floods generated during Tropical Storm Lee.

Friday morning started with the Chair's Breakfast. Scott Carney, public relations specialist with the Williams Company (one of the largest processors and transporters of natural gas in North America), spoke about the conservation partnerships his company has developed in the region. After the completion of the State society and Allegheny SAF business meetings, Clark Seely, National SAF Vice President, presented an update of national SAF issues and initiatives.

Mark Whitmore, Cornell University Extension provided an insect and disease update. Josh Parrish of the Nature Conservancy and Steve Respach of the Bethlehem Authority highlighted their successful partnership, Working Woodlands, as an example of collaborative private lands forest management. Stephanie Pendergrass Dalke, of the Pinchot Institute for Conservation, presented the Common Waters adaptation plan on key forest and water problems and strategies for managing forests to be more resilient in the future. Jonathan Kays, University of Maryland Extension, wrapped up the session by offering techniques to help our woodlands adapt to a changing climate.

A special "Thank you" to Todd Hagenbuch, Roberts Remillard, Richard Schwab and the entire Pinchot Chapter for hosting and preparing a great meeting!

Motion by Richard Lewis and seconded by Rachel Reyna to accept 2014 Summer Meeting Minutes was unanimously accepted.

Treasurer's report and Budget for 2015 provided by Steve Resh and accepted unanimously. Budget approved for \$17,000.00 – NJ approved for Forester Fund Grant Request to support student scholarship and membership (Initial approval for 80 % of grant or \$650). 2014 audit report conducted by Richard Lewis and Rachel Reyna and books balanced. Chair Kusko asked for a volunteer to be Audit Chair and no volunteers at this time. Chair Kusko asked attendees to seek a volunteer from their membership.

Chair Kusko gave summary of HSD meeting at National Convention in Salt Lake City, UT.

- Continue membership drive with emphasis on maintain and increasing membership.
- Look for ways to increase employer support for SAF members to attend SAF events, meetings, etc.
- Continue to engage students and increase their membership numbers National SAF is also encouraging students to join SAF on LinkedIn.
- Tara King (Inland Empire) elected Chair HSD for 2016.
- Upcoming National Conventions: 2015 Baton Rouge, LA; 2016 Madison, WI; 2017 Louisville, KY; 2018 Portland, OR.

Dennis Galway – Mentioned it is important for ANSAF and all the divisions and chapters eliciting contributions for student participation in SAF to keep a separate record of these

donations and to use those donations only towards student participations (membership, travel, registration, etc).

Board of Directors Representative Kurt Gottschalk – His first meeting is 3/1/15 – However, he mentioned a few important items. Kurt will be on Finance Committee helping with Budgets and Investments.

- First order of business By-laws to be now known as Policy Procedures
- National is unveiling a new meeting planning tool at mid-year that they are calling
 "meeting in a box." How to make meetings more beneficial and efficient; How to use
 webinars; How to negotiate contract from ordering coffee and food to room rates Kelton
 Chapman National Staff contact person

Jack Perdue report on website – Continues to request suggestions, information, input, and important dates for website content. However, doesn't see a need to use information found on other division, chapter, or national websites but willing to listen to opposite point of view. Continuing with project to scan old newsletters to website. Wants to migrate website to a more mobile format. Wants to put ads from newsletter on website.

Patricia Adadevoh, National Office Leadership Services Manager

- Will be working with State Leaders to help with challenges She will be putting together 10-15 minute webinars and "You Tube" videos for State Chairs. She is seeking input for topics. Some of topics she has will include Local Unit Insurance what's available under the national umbrella; how to recruit volunteers (start looking early). Chairs need to be involved in House Society Delegates (HSD).
- Patricia also reported that they have partnered with Ben Meadows to offer scholarships to students that show academic merit and exhibit leadership ability. Two \$2,500 scholarships will be provided to a junior or senior attending a 4-year accredited school.
- The Diversity Student Scholarship is still offered Diversity Student scholarship recipients are asked for yearlong commitment and paired with mentors and return to their respective schools and speaks of benefits of SAF and Forestry.
- To have a student SAF Chapter there is a minimum of 15 members required. However, meetings and student membership to SAF are encouraged even if this chapter requirement is not met. Student membership is \$40 and they get the Journal of Forestry.

Susan Lacy – Executive Director

- T-shirts great deal and selling well in profit. Have sweatshirts now too.
- Susan requests that all Division and Chapter Financial Statements that haven't been sent yet please get them to her by the end of March to complete ANSAF Tax report. Susan has

- initiated the process for requesting PA sates sales tax exemption. Application currently being reviewed by the Department of Revenue.
- Lloyd Casey Memorial Fund Contributions are about \$5,400.00. June 1st will be first year anniversary. More contributions are needed to meet the goal of \$20,000 in two years. Ideas suggested for alternate ways to grow fund. Funds could come from specific sources such as \$.50 of every ANSAF T-shirt sale and \$1.00 from every sweatshirt sale goes towards fund. A portion of other fund raisers like silent auctions or raffles could go towards fund.
- Need to revisit all committees and confirm a need, confirm they are filled and know their responsibilities, confirm names and contact info, and confirm reports of committee activities are required to be submitted at Summer and Winter meetings.
- Ned Karger has resigned as Program Coordinator.

Pennsylvania Private Land Owners Conference - Will ANSAF have presence?

Steve Resh made a motion to pay the SAF student membership fee for all participants of the Quiz Bowl. The motion was seconded by Steve Kallesser. It was approved unanimously. Stipulation was this was to be revisited every year for approval and that follow-up would be done to see if this helped with retention of student membership or regular membership after graduation.

Awards committee chair Jonathan Kays – Ken Jolly received the "Outstanding Service to Forestry" (OSTF) Award. The Student Leadership Award recipient was Jeffrey Osbourne. Jonathan mentioned that neither student that was nominated for the award was a SAF student member. Jonathan stated that for the OSTF Award nominees that did not receive the award should be resubmitted and not forgot about as these nominees have done amazing things for SAF and our profession.

Nominations Chair Rachel Reyna – Looking for nominations as this is an election year. Susan Lacy commented that we are an aging organization and we need "new blood", younger members to step into leadership roles!

MD/DE Division – Rob Feldt Chair - They had 2 meetings this year – Non-Native Invasive Species (NNIS) workshop and had Matt Menashes SAF CEO as a guest speaker at their last meeting. MD/DE will host next year's winter meeting in Baltimore at the Baltimore Plaza Hotel. The theme is "Cross Roads – Urban & Traditional Forestry". There will be a visit to the Port-of-Baltimore – Looking at Forest Products exports. Stay tuned for more information.

PA Division – Bob Merrill, Chair, sent letter in support of Northern Long-eared Bat SAF Tri-State Letter sent to US Fish & Wildlife Service.

West Virginia Division – Melissa Thomas-Van Gundy, Chair

- Good summer meeting at Cacapon Resort State Park 9/8-9/10/14 with 101 members attending.
- "Forester at Home" Print Fund that helps fund educational-student programs.
- Meeting in Flatwood 3/11-3/12/15 "Finding Good Loggers" John Deere Equipment representative will be present and a lawyer to discuss contracts.
- A letter was sent to WV State Forestry supporting their management
- A recent survey was conducted by Glenville State & West Virginia University to show state legislators that students are moving away to get good jobs

Ken Jolly Receives the Outstanding Service to Forestry Award



The Outstanding Service to Forestry Award, named for Bob Bauer and his many career accomplishments, was awarded this year to Ken Jolly (photo – Awards Chair Jonathan Kays (l) presents the award to Ken Jolly). The award serves to provide official recognition for professional achievements in forestry; to recognize superior service to the Society of American Foresters; and to educate the public on the importance of the forestry profession. Ken exemplifies all of those criteria.

Ken has over 30 years or professional forestry experience. He started his career by graduating *cum laude* from North

Carolina State University with a BS in Forestry. He later added to his education by completing an MS in Applied Management at the University of Maryland. For the past 27 years, Ken has served with the Maryland DNR Forest Service, with the last two decades in a series of senior leadership positions reporting the Maryland State Forester. For the past 14 years, he has been the Associate Director/Chief of Operations, where he was responsible for the statewide leadership of agency operations on public and private forestlands. Prior to his current position, Ken was a regional forester covering a five-county area in southern Maryland. Earlier in his career, Ken served for 2 years with the USDA Forest Service in California and Colorado as well as another 2 years with the Peace Corps in Honduras.

Some of Ken's professional accomplishments include collaborative leadership of the first SFI and FSC Forest Certification on Maryland public forestlands in 2003 on the Chesapeake Forest, and for subsequent certification scope expansions in 2009 and 2011 to include all Maryland State Forests. He led his agency's efforts to define and designate High Conservation Value Forests on public and private lands and create an innovative three-tier classification system for prioritizing agency Stewardship Plan preparation. Ken also provided leadership with the American Forest Foundation- American Tree Farm System and Maryland forestry partners to rebuild the Maryland Tree Farm Committee. His work led to successful outcomes for Maryland Tree Farm Certification audits in 2010 and 2014.

In addition to his professional position with Maryland Forest Service, Ken has an extensive record of service to SAF at all levels. Within the Maryland/Delaware Division, he has served as an officer and a member of many committees.
