#### West Virginia Division of the SAF

The West Virginia Division of the Society of American Foresters held their Summer/Fall Meeting on August 31st and September 1<sup>st</sup>, 2017 at Isaac Jackson Conference Center and Hotel in Elkins, WV.

On Thursday approximately twenty-five members attended a field trip to the Kochenderfer Tree Farm just west of Parsons near the Randolph/Tucker county line, hosted by Jim and Jeff Kochenderfer.

The field tour was followed by a tour at the Appalachian Forest Heritage Area's Appalachian Forest Discovery Center. The museum houses information and displays relevant to Appalachian forest history, culture, natural history, forest management and forest products.

Phyllis Baxter, Executive Director of the of the Appalachian Forest Heritage Area (AFHA), introduces Discovery Center displays to SAFers.

THE APPALACHIAN FOREST DISCOVERY CENTER museum and visitor center is located on the first floor of the historic Darden Mill in downtown Elkins. Here, the visitor will learn about the Appalachian region's rich cultural and forest heritage: how the people of this region interacted with this dynamic forest resource and how it, in turn, molded and influenced them. One can also get information here about other forest heritage sites to visit in AFHA, and purchase forest heritage related items in the gift shop. In addition there is also a new exhibit each year exploring one of these topics in more depth. For 2017, this rotating exhibit will focus on Forestry and its history, legacy, and impact on the Appalachian Forest Heritage Area:

# The Kurt Cottschalk Science Fund

Named after a past chair of the Forest Science and Technology Board, the Kurt Gottschalk Science Fund supports projects that conduct and/or support forestry research, conduct and/or support continuing education activities and the transfer of knowledge, and promote collaboration and relationships with other SAF entities and external groups.

The following is information for those interested in applying for a grant/scholarship available through the Kurt Gottschalk Science Fund:

#### **Project Proposals**

Proposals must meet one or more of the Fund's goals and can include, but not limited to, the following:

- Conduct and/or support forestry research including graduate student funding, identification or prioritization
  of research needs, literature reviews, and to collect preliminary data to develop a larger proposal.
- Conduct continuing education activities including conferences, panel discussions, and workshops
- Conduct outreach effects such as publications, special issues of the *Journal of Forestry*, and websites

#### Eligibility

Any SAF member, representing either an SAF unit or an external entity, is eligible to submit a proposal, given the endorsement of one or more SAF Working Groups.

**Proposals** must include:

#### **Summary of Project**

A brief project summary (up to 200 words) that captures the goals, methods, and final products of the project.

#### **Objectives**

A clear statement of the specific objectives of the project and how they meet the goals of the Science Fund.

#### **Methods**

A detailed description of the specific steps that will be used to accomplish the stated objectives including how learning outcomes will be measured.

#### **Products**

A clear statement of the anticipated final product(s) of the project.

#### Recognition

A description of how SAF will be credited for the project.

#### **Budget**

Provide an overall project budget and detailed list of items or services for which the requested funds will be spent. Project collaborators or in-kind support should be listed.

#### **Project Duration**

Project completion dates should typically be within 1 to 2 years of the date of the grant application.

#### **Deadlines**

Proposals are due February 15 and August 15 for three types of funding:

- Loans (up to \$5,000)
- Regular Grants (up to \$2,500)
- Special Grants (up to \$5,000)

Those submitting proposals are encouraged to contact SAF prior to developing and submitting a proposal to inquire whether funds are available.

Three new awards have been added to the suite of national awards to provide for recognition of excellence in the areas of student leadership, leadership in diversity, and leadership in employer support. The three new awards are Diversity Leadership Award, Employer Leadership Award, and Student Leadership Award.

### **Fellows**

One of the highest honors for members of the Society, the rank of Fellow is an exceptional recognition bestowed on a member by his or her peers for outstanding contributions and service to the SAF and the profession.

# **Forest Science and Technology Awards**

#### **Award in Forest Science**

The Award in Forest Science recognizes distinguished individual research in any branch of the quantitative, managerial, and/or social sciences leading to the advancement of forestry.

#### **Barrington Moore Memorial Award**

The Barrington Moore Memorial Award recognizes outstanding achievement in biological research leading to the advancement of forestry.

#### **Technology Transfer Award**

The Technology Transfer Award recognizes outstanding performance in the areas of technology transfer, implementation and extension.

## **Communications Awards**

#### **Outstanding Forestry Journalism Award**

The Outstanding Forestry Journalism Award recognizes high quality journalistic coverage of topics that increase the American public's understanding of forestry and natural resources.

#### W. D. Hagenstein Communicator Award

The Hagenstein Communicator Award recognizes an SAF member who leads innovative and exemplary communications initiatives and programs that increase the general public's understanding of forestry and natural resources.

# **Professional Development Awards**

#### Carl Alwin Schenck Award

The Carl Alwin Schenck Award recognizes devotion and demonstrated outstanding performance in the field of forestry education.

#### John A. Beale Memorial Award

The John A. Beale Memorial Award recognizes outstanding efforts over a sustained period of time by an SAF member in the promotion of forestry through voluntary service to the Society.

#### **Gifford Pinchot Medal**

The Gifford Pinchot Medal recognizes outstanding contributions by a forestry professional in the administration, practice, and professional development of North American Forestry.

#### Sir William Schlich Memorial Award

The Sir William Schlich Memorial Award recognizes broad and outstanding contributions to the field of forestry with emphasis on, but not limited to, policy and national or international activities.

#### **Honorary Membership**

The Honorary Membership Award recognizes individuals whose contributions to forestry are viewed as outstanding by their peers.

#### **Young Forester Leadership Award**

The Young Forester Leadership Award recognizes outstanding leadership by a young forestry professional in the development and promotion of an individual program or project, or for a sustained leadership role benefiting the practice of forestry and the Society of American Foresters.

# **Leadership Awards**

#### **Diversity Leadership Award**

The Diversity Leadership Award recognizes outstanding individual achievement leading to innovative and exemplary diversity and inclusion efforts.

#### **Employer Leadership Award**

The Employer Leadership Award recognizes an employer that demonstrates leadership through consistent support of employee participation in SAF and broad engagement in the profession.

### **Student Leadership Award**

The Student Leadership Award recognizes individual student achievement and leadership at the local, regional, or national level.

# **Presidential Field Forester Awards**

The Presidential Field Forester Awards recognize foresters who have dedicated their professional careers to the application of forestry on the ground using sound, scientific methods and adaptive management strategies. The awards are presented to individuals who have displayed uncommon talent, skill, and innovative methods to achieve a record of excellence in the application of forest management.

# **Outstanding SAF Student Chapter Award**

The Outstanding SAF Student Chapter Award recognizes the outstanding SAF student chapter in the nation and its faculty representative during an academic year.

Three student chapters are recognized annually during the SAF National Convention. The first place student chapter will receive a \$500 honorarium. All three student chapters will be recognized in *The Forestry Source*. The school's department head and/or dean, the university president, and the SAF faculty representative will receive notification of the award.



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# The Society of American Foresters at the 2017 National Boy Scout Jamboree

From July 19<sup>th</sup> through July 27<sup>th</sup>, West Virginia hosted scouts and scouters from throughout the United States, US territories, and many countries at scouting's world class Summit Bechtel Reserve.

Approximately 35,000 campers descended on Glen Jean, West Virginia to experience the opportunity to meet other scouts and experience high adventure on 11,000 acres near the New River Gorge.

Located on the west end of Summit Center on a forested ridge was a series of tents featuring exhibits and activities all related to natural resources. Foresters, wildlife biologists, and other resource professionals from state, federal, and the private sector, staff what was known as the "Conservation Trail". Realizing that many scouts become interested in natural resource careers during their scouting experience, the National Conservation Task Force of the Boy Scouts invited natural resource organizations to participate in this outreach program in past jamborees. This tradition continues and the Conservation Trail is where scouts learn about natural resource professions while having fun in a wooded environment.

earn a special patch. As the Jamboree has a WLAN, QR codes were provided to take participants to websites to find answers.

At our location on the Conservation trail, we had 2,844 visitors from 48 states – only New Mexico & South Dakota didn't stop by but we had scouts/leaders from Australia, Aruba, England, Haiti, Japan, Norway, Sweden, Peru, Taiwan, and Thailand. We worked 67 hours which translated to 42 visitors/ hour.

At the leadership luncheon, Jamie Schuler, current West Virginia Division chair, accepted a plaque of appreciation from the Boy Scouts for SAF participating on the conservation trail at this National Jamboree. Jamie, who has a son in scouting, added his thoughts on his volunteer experience on the Conservation Trail. "The future is looking bright for forestry and other natural resource professions. My conversations with a great number of boy scouts revealed their excitement and interest in the outdoors. Our job is to show them that we can manage our natural resources in ways that are sustainable and beneficial to society."

Leading the Conservation Trail as Chairman was Mike Huneke. Mike works for the USFS and is a member of the Maryland/Delaware Division of the Allegheny SAF having served as chapter chair in 2006-2007. He was recognized for his efforts on the Boy Scouts National Conservation Task Force and presented The William T. Hornaday Gold Medal, BSA's highest individual conservation award. It recognizes unusual and distinguished service in natural resource conservation and environmental improvement at the regional, national, or international level.
